NOTES OF THE MEETING HELD 8TH JANUARY 2019

President **Graham Harker** opened the meeting at 19.30 hours and welcomed the 15 members present. The evening was devoted to Members' Displays with the Letters: **W, X, Y, Z**.

- 1. **Pauline MacBroom** began with her mother's 1941 passport from the **Z**anzibar Protectorate where she was a nurse. The passport had **Z**anzibar stamps officially used in it and also on display were covers from **Z**anzibar.
- 2. **Brian Asquith** showed covers for each of the **four letters** including one with a boxed "THIS LETTER HAS BEEN **X**-RAYED".
- 3. **Chris Board** displayed H.S. Wilkinson's involvement in the design of the first Union of South Africa stamps in 1910/1911.
- 4. **David Millsted** filled a frame of World War 1, War Tax stamps including examples from Jamaica, Cayman Islands, Ceylon and Madagascar.
- 5. **John Ray** presented covers from settlements in Fiji where the names began with the letters **W** and **Y**. On display were wreck covers, one from a ship and one from an aircraft.

- 6. **David Rennie** produced a comprehensive display of the World's first thematic stamp, the Black Swan from Western Australia. This included printings by various companies, and varieties. Finally a Gold Coast stamp was shown which had been used to forge a **Z**ululand £5.
- 7. Paul Percival displayed stamps from Yemen, Yugoslavia, Zambia, Zanzibar and Zimbabwe.
- 8. **Graham Harker** showed un-mounted mint Queen Elizabeth II regional stamps from Wales, which were first produced in the 1958. He posed the question why the Post Office began to produce regional stamps when there were already definitive stamps available for Great Britain.
- 9. **Chris Hitchen's** French World War II covers included military free post, censorship, a slogan postmark from the beginning of 1940 and ended with the fall of France on 22 June 1940.
- 10.**John Schofield** brought lots of "W's" including Wallaroos from Australia, Whales from Greenland, French X pre-cancels and a Xylophone ending with Zebras, Zebus and Emile Zola.
- 11. Frank Simpson showed Watermarks from Brunswick and Hanover followed by Waterloo subscription envelopes, a Wagon Train advert from the Waterloo campaign, a cover from a prisoner of war. in Zaragosa and finally a splendid cover from Zanzibar to his favourite Goslar.

President Graham concluded the evening at 21.30 hours by thanking the members for the high quality and variety of their material which had made it such a memorable evening.
